## 1 INTRODUCTION

Z-Wave evolved from a remote control-centric idea. A customer would buy a remote control and three plug-in modules. The remote control was a portable controller knowing the entire network. When buttons on the remote control were to be controlling the plug-in modules, the setup of the buttons was manipulated from within the remote control menu system.

Support for sensor nodes was added later. The remote control would set up associations in a sensor device to make it control a plug-in module.

Going towards larger installations, there is a need for installer tools that will present all resources of an installed network; even if the system spans multiple IP subnets on heterogeneous PHYs – and even if some resources are battery operated and sleeping most of the time.

## 1.1 Purpose

The purpose of the Z-Wave Resource Directory (RD) is to ensure that sufficient data is made available to intelligent network management systems. The following requirements apply:

- PHY agnostic
- Highest possible degree of compatibility with discovery technologies used by other major technologies in the industry such as IETF CoAP
- Support for battery operated devices
- Put only a minor load on the HAN network
- Enable large installations like hotels; several buildings, wings, levels, rooms, i.e. many subnets
- Enable call-center support by allowing service providers to remotely set up remote controls and sensors for non-technical users

## 1.2 Relation to classic Z-Wave

The Z-Wave Resource Directory (RD) provides access to information regarding IP hosts which implement Z-Wave services. A rich set of node properties may be queried from the Z-Wave Resource Directory (RD).

This document makes no assumptions as to how the RD is reached or how Z-Wave resources are. Information stored in the RD MAY be accessed via mDNS or other discovery protocols.

## 1.3 Relation to other standards

The Z/IP RD description leverages on the data structures and principles defined for IETF CoRE Resource Directory [7].

For backwards compatibility with classic Z-Wave properties, there are a few differences from the CoRE RD architecture.

A CoRE RD Endpoint is an IPv6 address and a port number.  
A Z/IP RD End Point is an IP address and a Z-Wave End Point ID.

A CoRE resource delivers data to the CoRE RD in a push style.  
A Z/IP RD retrieves data from Z-Wave resources in a pull style.

Some information is converted and merged by the Z/IP RD based on limited binary information available in classic Z-Wave nodes.

## 1.1 Terms used in this document

The guidelines outlined in RFC 2119, [1] apply. Essentially, the key words "MUST", "MUST NOT", "REQUIRED", "SHOULD", "SHOULD NOT", "RECOMMENDED", "MAY", and "OPTIONAL" in this document are to be interpreted as described in RFC 2119.

NOTE: This specification may refer to Internet Drafts. Internet Drafts are by definition "work in progress". An implementation SHOULD NOT reference to Internet Drafts. An implementor SHOULD make sure that the Internet Draft has become an RFC at release time.

## 2 Z/IP RD MANAGEMENT

Node name and location information managed by the Z/IP RD is mDNS compatible and **MUST** be accessed via the Z/IP Naming and Location Command Class.

The RD manages UTF-8 strings up to 63 octets long and identified by [IP address, End PointID]. The information is used for constructing DNS names for mDNS service discovery.

When a user replaces a resource, i.e. assigns the same name to a new resource, the old resource name **MUST NOT** be notified in a Goodbye message. Rather, the resource **MUST** be re-announced so that clients can re-resolve resource properties.

When receiving a Z/IP Name Set command with the Replace option, the Z/IP RD **MUST** reset the old resource name to an auto-generated name based on the product name and unique values. If the resource is End Point 1 or higher, the autogenerated name **MUST** be <End PointID>.<resource name for End PointID 0>, e.g. "1.TV Powerstrip".

### 3 Z/IP SERVICE DISCOVERY PRINCIPLES

Identification of Z-Wave resources via the Z/IP Resource Directory (RD) MAY be done using mDNS [5]. The Z/IP RD is populated via gathering of node information.

This document only addresses the management of the Z/IP RD.

#### 3.1 Terminology

An IP host may implement multiple Z-Wave resources. The IP address identifies the IP host. The UDP port 41230 provides secure access to Z-Wave resources. The Z/IP End Point identifies the individual Z-Wave resource. A Z-Wave resource implements one or more Z-Wave services via Z-Wave Command Classes.

The Z/IP End Point identifies individual Z-Wave resources within an IP host.

As an example, a power strip may be accessed via the IPv6 address and UDP port [fd06:1e14:c501:ffff::ff:fe00:1]:41230. A Z/IP message pointing to Z/IP End Point #0 controls the global device. For instance Z/IP End Point #0 may control all four outputs of the power strip and Z/IP End Points #1 thru #4 controls each individual output of the power strip. However, this behavior is device specific..

End Point numbering allows a graphical GUI to group resources within the same graphical frame. The host name is the same for all End Points.

#### 3.2 The Resource Directory

The Z/IP RD organizes data so that various discovery protocols may be used to discover Z-Wave resources in a specific HAN or to make wildcard searches for a particular Z-Wave service (supporting a particular Z-Wave Command Class).

mDNS is one such discovery protocol. The use of mDNS for discovery of Z-Wave resources is described in [5].

The Resource Directory implements cache monitoring to ensure freshness of cache contents.



## 4 REQUIREMENTS

### 4.1 Z/IP RD

#### 4.1.1 Building the database

A Z/IP RD SHOULD build its database during node inclusion; querying the properties of each Z-Wave node.

A Z/IP RD MAY monitor traffic from the HAN. When traffic from an unknown node is detected, node properties may be requested from the node.

Each Z-Wave resource MUST be identified by an IP address and a Z/IP End Point ID.

#### 4.1.2 Database records

The following information MUST be available in the Z/IP RD.

The construction of mDNS announcements from contents of a CoRE RD is defined in [8]. The CoRE properties listed in Table 1 are defined in [7].

Readers guidance for Table 1:

- Some lines of the Z/IP Property column are marked by the tag “(same)”. This indicates that this property is common to all resources (End Points) of the actual node)
- The CoRE Property column also contains pointers to the mDNS records that receive the actual information

#### 4.1.2.1 Node Name

The Node Name MUST be the same for all End Points of a particular node. The Node Name MUST NOT be exposed to end users via mDNS. Rather, the End Point Name MUST be used to represent resources. The Z/IP RD MUST auto-generate a Node Name as follows:

zw<HomeID><NodeID>

The user MUST NOT leave the name field blank (zero-length).

#### 4.1.2.2 End Point Location

Named the Resource Location by the Z/IP mDNS Responder, this information is dedicated to a single End Point.

The per-End Point relation allows an end-user to use a multi-outlet power strip for a system spanning several locations, e.g.

*all-lamps.garden*      as well as      *all-lamps.swimmingpool*

The location information MAY be the same for all End Points.

The user MAY leave the location field blank (zero-length).

#### 4.1.2.3 End Point Name

Named the Resource Name by the Z/IP mDNS Responder, this information is dedicated to a single End Point.

When discovering Z-Wave resources for the first time, the Z/IP RD MUST import the available Name and Location Information stored in Z-Wave nodes. The Z/IP RD MUST auto-generate unique resource names anyway in the following cases:

- Name and Location command class is not supported
- No Name and Location information is available in the node
- Identical Name and Location information is gathered from multiple nodes

The Z/IP RD maintains Name and Location information for each resource. If the user specifies Name and Location during inclusion of a new node, the same resource name MUST be assigned to all End Points

of that node. A unique label **MUST** be appended to each End Point to achieve uniqueness of resource names. The user **MAY** subsequently change any Name and Location information.

The End Point Name **MUST NOT** be the same for multiple End Points if the End Point Location is the same.

If both End Point Name and End Point Location are empty, the Z/IP RD **MUST** auto-generate an End Point Name as follows:

```

```

If no product information is available, the Z/IP RD **MUST** auto-generate an End Point Name as follows:

```
<DeviceType> [<HomeID><NodeID><End PointID>]
```

Users may enter identical information for more resources. If several End Point Name and End Point Location entries are identical, the Z/IP RD **MUST** auto-append unique data to each of the conflicting End Point Names:

```
<user provided resource name> [<HomeID><NodeID><End PointID>]
```

If End Point Name and End Point Location entries are unique the Z/IP RD **SHOULD NOT** auto-append any additional data.

#### 4.1.2.4 End Point Information

The End Point Information field may hold up to 63 binary octet values.

The Z/IP RD maintains an extended version of the Node Information frame format.

A Z-Wave node may implement only supported command classes. Thus, a Z-Wave node **MAY** omit the COMMAND\_CLASS\_MARK and following controlled command classes.

In case a Z-Wave node has no supported command classes and that node advertises command classes which can control other nodes, the command class list **MUST** start with the identifier COMMAND\_CLASS\_MARK.

The extended version of the Node Information frame format appends specific type information to the command classes such as the Multilevel Sensor Command Class.

The concept is identical to the behavior when exchanging extended command classes. One or two bytes may follow the first byte, depending on the command class in question.

Two examples are provided below:

**Table 3, Meter Command Class entry for Z/IP RD Node Information structure**

Command Class = Command Class Meter
Meter Type = Electric Meter

**Table 4, Multilevel Sensor Command Class entry for Z/IP RD Node Information structure**

Command Class = Command Class Multilevel Sensor
Sensor Type = Power
Sensor Scale = W

A requesting client MAY query the sensor scale. It may for instance matter if the power sensor measures electricity or gas.

It is NOT RECOMMENDED that the Sensor Scale is queried if all possible outcomes can be used. For instance Air Temperature may be returned in Celsius or Fahrenheit. Most receiving hosts will be able to handle both temperature units.

The Z/IP RD MUST offer query records for [Sensor Type] only as well as for each [Sensor Type + Sensor Scale] tuple; e.g.

- 3101: Air Temperature
- 310100: Air Temperature, Celsius

If the Multilevel Sensor supports more than one type, individual entries MUST be created for each type. If the Multilevel sensor supports more than one scale, individual entries MUST be created for each scale.

#### Meter resources

The Z/IP RD MUST offer query records for [Meter Type] only as well as for each [Meter Type + Meter Scale] tuple; e.g.

- 3201: Electric Meter
- 3201??: Electric Meter, kWh

If the Meter supports more than one type, individual entries MUST be created for each type.

If the Meter supports more than one scale, individual entries MUST be created for each scale.

#### **4.1.2.5 End Point ID**

A single byte value indicating the End Point ID. A resource is completely identified by the combination of the Host IP address and the End PointID.

The End PointID is included in the generation of unique resource names.

#### **4.1.2.6 HomeID and NodeID**

The HomeID and NodeID values are used in the reactive generation of unique resource names and for auto-generation of resource names as well as for host names.

#### 4.1.2.7 Icon Types

The Icon field contains two Icon Type values.

Each End Point has two such icons.

Octets 0..1 carry an icon type to be used for an installer tool GUI, while octets 2.3 carry an icon type to be used for an end user GUI.

#### 4.1.2.8 Communication Mode

The Communication Mode field is maintained by the Z/IP RD. The field may hold the following values:

- nonlistening
- alwayslistening
- frequentlylistening
- mailbox

The Communication Mode value MUST be an enumerated value chosen from the list above. In a typical implementation the Communication Mode value remains static during the lifetime of a node.

#### 4.1.2.9 Operational Mode

The Operational Mode field is maintained by the Z/IP RD. The field may hold a number of flags concurrently:

- Low Battery
- Failing

The Operational Mode value reflects the current state of the node.

The failing mode MUST indicate that the Z/IP RD has failed to communicate to the node.

The Low Battery mode MUST indicate that the Z/IP RD has received Low Battery notifications from the node.

#### 4.1.3 Maintaining a valid database

To ensure the reliability of the database it must be ensured that nodes appearing in the database are also alive in the network. In most cases, data does not change, but nodes may disappear due to low battery, technical failure or other reasons.

This section applies to resources which implement the WakeUp Command Class:

If a resource timestamp is older than three times the WakeUp Notification Interval, the resource MUST be marked as failing. Failing resources MUST be announced during service discovery.

A resource SHOULD be marked as operational at any time upon the reception of a new WakeUp Notification.

This section applies to resources which do not implement the WakeUp Command Class:

The Z/IP RD MUST send NOPs on a periodic basis to make sure that the database stays valid. If not receiving responses for 3 consecutive NOPs, the Z/IP RD MUST mark the resource as failing.

The interval used for periodic NOPs SHOULD be 70 minutes.

#### **4.1.4 Preventing database divergence**

This section presents a requirement to the Z/IP Router, but requires the use of the Z/IP RD.

In case a node is included in the Z-Wave network via "Replace Failed", the operation SHOULD be reported to the Z/IP RD by the Z/IP Router application.

If the database contents for the resource do not match the capabilities of the new node, the resource MUST be re-announced with its new properties. As an example, a dimmer may be replaced by an on-off switch module.

## 5 INTERFACING THE Z/IP RD TO AN MDNS RESPONDER

The mDNS responder is essentially a slim interface layer to a DNS server. The DNS server must support mDNS transmissions, allow leading underscores in DNS record elements and tolerate binary data and UTF-8 characters in TXT records.

The following interface functions must be made available to the Z/IP RD to announce and de-announce resources in mDNS. Refer to [5] for details on the mDNS responder.

The mDNS responder MUST support mDNS queries for `_services._dns-sd._udp.local.` ; returning the answer `_z-wave._udp.local.`

There is a DNS limit of 63 octets for the part left of “`_z-wave._udp`”.

### 5.1 ResourceProbe()

As specified in [9], a new resource name MUST NOT be announced before the mDNS responder has ensured that the name is unique.

This call may take time. An implementation must provide a call-back that informs the Z/IP RD on the completion of the call and the result.

### 5.2 ResourcePropertiesClear()
